## PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES

**Faculty Promotions:** The Board of Trustees approved the promotion of Dr. Guillaume de Syon and Professor Kristen Woodward to the rank of Professor; the tenure and promotion of Dr. Fouad Kalouche, Dr. Kennon Rice, and Dr. Gerald Ronning to the rank of Associate Professor.

**Sabbatical Leaves:** The Board of Trustees approved sabbatical leaves for Dr. Jon Bekken, Dr. Lisa Bellatoni, Dr. Thomas Brogan, Dr. Marsha Green, Dr. Richard Heller, Dr. Jerry Lee, Dr. Julia Matthews, Dr. Farhad Saboori, Dr. Patricia Snyder, and Dr. Barton Thomas for the 2009-2010 academic year.

**NCUR Accepts Three Submissions:** Each of the three submissions to the National Conference for Undergraduate Research was accepted this year. **Christian S. Hamann** (Chemistry & Biochemistry) and Trevor A. Hamlin '11 submitted an abstract titled "Periodic Trends in the Structure of 2p and 3p Real and Theoretical Molecules and Ions." Their work, was supported by an Interim ACRE award and performed in collaboration with Dean J. Tantillo, Ph.D., at the University of California – Davis. In addition to Trevor and Chris, two other Albright submissions were made and accepted: **Ian Rhile** (Chemistry and Biochemistry) and senior Crina Sasaran's "Turning 10-Methylphenothiazine into a Hydrogen Atom Transfer Agent"; and **Steve Mech** (Biology) and junior Sara Parsons', "Using Microsatellite Analysis to Determine Allele Frequencies in White-Footed Mice." The conference will be held at the University of Wisconsin - LaCrosse in April, 2009.

**Jon Bekken** (English/Communications) has co-edited the volume, *Radical Economics and Labor*, which has now been published by Routledge. AK Press has just released a new edition of Louis Adamic's classic history of the American labor movement, *Dynamite*, with a new introduction by Bekken which places the book in the context of popular labor histories, and critically reconsiders the volume's treatment of race, violence and social history. M.E. Sharpe has released the *Encyclopedia of Strikes in American History*, which includes Bekken's chapter on Newsboy Strikes.

**Guillaume de Syon** (History) presented a paper at the AHA annual meeting on French nuclear culture in the 1950s; Guillaume also published a textbook on science and technology in daily European life (Greenwood, 2008).

**Victor Forte** (Religious Studies) on Dec. 29, 2008, presented at the annual American Philosophical Association conference in Philadelphia. A paper entitled "A Small Boat Drifting: Deconstructing the Institutionalizing Conflicts in the Career of Dōgen" was presented on a panel discussing institutionalization in Zen Buddhism.

**Ethan Joella** (ESL/English) has a poem and a short story appearing in the January issue of *Perigee: A Publication for the Arts*.

**Karen Jogan** (Spanish) was the plenary speaker at the Penn TESOL East conference “Teaching with Technology,” held at Holy Family University in Philadelphia in January. She was the plenary speaker for the “Educational Technology for EFL programs” at the Universidad de Concepción in Chile, where she also presented sessions on podcasting, e-portfolio implementation, and creating mashups. Karen was a keynote speaker at the conference “Content and Context in World Language Teaching” organized by the Joseph H. Lauder Institute of Management and International Studies at the University of Pennsylvania; her presentation was “The City as Content in World Language Teaching.” In addition, Karen is one of three professors named to the national evaluation panel to select student Fulbright award grantees for Chile and Argentina. In December, she completed a review of assessment standards for a university in Puerto Rico along with other members of a Middle States team.

**Betsy Kiddy** (History) presented the paper “Gestão dos Recursos Hídricos e o poder do Estado” (The Management of Water Resources and the Power of the State) which examined theoretical approaches to thinking about the historical control of water, at the seminar “Questões Urbanas e Desenvolvimento Regional” (Issues in Regional and Urban Development) at the University Salvador (Unifacs) in Salvador, Bahia, Brazil in November 2008. Her book chapter “Quem é o rei do Congo? Um novo olhar sobre os reis africanos e afro-brasileiros no Brasil” (published in the United States as “Who is the King of Congo? A New Look at African and Afro-Brazilian Kings in Brazil”) was published in the collection edited by Linda M Heywood, *Díáspora Negra no Brasil* (São Paulo: Editora Contexto, 2008), 165-191.

**Geoffrey D. Schad** (History) has been elected Secretary-Treasurer of the Syrian Studies Association. In January he spoke to the Berks Peace Community on Afghanistan and participated in a panel discussion on BCTV's "Community Conversations" on the foreign-policy issues facing the new Presidential administration.

**Kristen Woodward** (Art) had a painting accepted into NYU's 32<sup>nd</sup> Small Works Exhibit. The show opens at the Washington Square East Gallery in NYC on Sat., Jan. 31<sup>st</sup>, and runs through March 13<sup>th</sup>, 2009. The juror was Daniel Ferris, Director of the Stephen Haller Gallery.

## FACULTY AWARD NOMINATIONS NEEDED

The Awards Committee is pleased to announce that this year Albright will present five faculty awards. It invites nominations (including self-nominations). Please submit brief letters of nomination to Guillaume de Syon ([gdesyon@alb.edu](mailto:gdesyon@alb.edu)) by **March 13, 2009**. Following the nomination process, the Awards Committee will ask the nominees to provide additional materials, with a final deadline for all materials of **April 15, 2009**. Here is a description of each award:

1) The **Lindback Distinguished Teaching Award** is awarded each year to one member of the faculty who best exemplifies the criteria for teaching excellence. This award cannot be given to any faculty member more than once.

- 2) The **Dr. Henry P. and M. Page Laughlin Distinguished Faculty Award** is awarded each year to the faculty member who is deemed to be most worthy of recognition for distinguished teaching.
- 3) The **Class of '49 Annadora Vesper Shirk Award for Outstanding Faculty Scholarship** is awarded each year to a faculty member who best exemplifies a commitment to scholarship and creativity.
- 4) The **Dr. Henry P. and M. Page Laughlin Research Award** honors ongoing work in the field of the laureate.
- 5) The **United Methodist Church Teaching Award** will be given to the faculty member who best exemplifies a combined spirit of teaching and commitment to the Albright community. The laureate will be chosen in mid February, and nominations are also welcome.

### **ALBRIGHT REPRESENTED IN KENNEDY CENTER AMERICAN COLLEGE THEATRE FESTIVAL**

The Theatre Department was well represented at the Region II Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival, held Jan 13-17 at University of the Arts in Philadelphia. The Domino Players presented their recent production of Shakespeare's "Love's Labour's Lost" to an enthusiastic audience at the Merriam Theatre on Jan 15, directed by **Julia Matthews** (Theatre), designed by **Wayne Vettleson** (Theatre) and **Paula Trimpey** (Theatre, Fashion), and featuring **John Pankratz** (History) as Boyet. **Jeffrey Lentz** (Theatre, Music) and Cocol Bernal (Domino Players) presented a workshop on artistic collaboration. Paula Trimpey's costumes were featured in the Festival closing ceremony. Faculty accompanied a group of 28 Albright students who participated in a wide range of theatrical workshops, competitions, and play development projects.

7. **Retention:** During the Fall '08 semester, the Retention Task Force processed 129 cases. Of those cases, 77 were retained until Spring '09, 47 attrited, and 1 graduated. Of 38 students who were dismissed academically, 17 were not reported using a student alert form by faculty. All faculty should be regularly monitoring their students' and advisees' progress and completing the alert form for any student who is in jeopardy of not succeeding academically. We need faculty support. Many thanks to the 36 faculty members who did submit alert forms (many multiple times) last semester.
  
8. **Albright Early Learning Center Director Appointed:** Effective January 2009, Laura Heckart, Interim Director of the Albright Early Learning Center, was named permanent Director. Laura is an enthusiastic and committed director, who will continue to facilitate the Center's success.
  
9. **Department Chair Changes:** The following academic department changes took effect January 2009: Biology – David Osgood, Economics and Business – Lisa Wilder (chair) and Richard Schott (vice chair), History – Elizabeth Kiddy. Jennifer Koosed, chair of religious studies, will be on sabbatical during the spring semester. William King will serve as the department chair in her place.
  
10. **Esther Edwards Graduate Scholarship Available:** The Esther Edwards Graduate Scholarship is for a female administrator or faculty member interested in pursuing advanced studies for a Ph.D. or appropriate terminal degree that will provide the basis for leadership in higher education with a United Methodist college or university. This may be in any academic field. Applicants must be presently employed at a United Methodist college or university and recommended by the college president, academic dean, or faculty member at their institution for consideration. The scholarship is awarded to one (1) recipient annually and is part of the United Methodist Scholarship Program. The value of the scholarship is

- 11. Graduate Division Update:** A new two track proposal for completing the capstone piece for the Master's Degree was approved by the EPC at its November meeting. Graduate students will now have a choice between a research-based track and a professional track. The purpose of the new track is to allow Master's Degree candidates to have a wider choice of options for the final capstone piece with more direct mentoring for that piece. Since a significant number of students completing all but the final research project in the past, this change should increase the number of degree completers/ recipients. If anyone desires more detail or explanation concerning the new track, please contact Sarel Fuchs, Graduate Dean.
  
- 12. Academic Learning Center Update:** The Learning Center has seen the following activity to date: 349 tutor requests; 86 tutors on staff; 26 requests not assigned (due to lack of appropriate tutor – either as a matter of tutor load or classes not covered). The office has had 337 student visits – 102 for exams; 80 for in-office tutoring; and 155 other consultations, either by appointment or walk-in. The ALC wishes to acknowledge the contribution and hard work of Lindsay Krejci, our Education graduate student worker, who has had a large and positive impact during her tenure in the Learning Center. She will begin her student teaching in January.

M – by Fritz Lang

The International Film Series presents Fritz Lang's masterpiece "...the complex analysis of urban German society offered in *M*, clearly influenced by Brecht's *Threepenny Opera*, offers a fascinating look at that society and what it was becoming.... As a city is terrorized by the crimes of a deranged murderer of little girls, not only the police but other criminals and even beggars, threatened by the panic that puts everyone under suspicion, decide they have to help track the culprit down to protect their own interests. Lang steadily crosscuts between the efforts of these three separate factions, the public at large, and the murderer himself (Peter Lorre), graphically describing each stage of the pursuit and at the same time exposing the inner life of the city. Arguably, no other thriller has so effectively combined exposition and suspense with a portrait of an entire society, and *M* does this through a dazzling system of visual rhymes and aural continuities, spatial leaps and thematic repetitions that virtually reinvents the art of movie storytelling." – Jonathan Rosenbaum, *Chicago Reader*.

The Scene of the Crime: Violence in the Weimar Republic

A Lecture by Emily Godbey, Klein Hall

March 4 at 5pm

This lecture covers the growing interest in the crime scene as it became part of visual culture in Germany's Weimar Republic. In short, images of violence that once had been viewed only by criminologists found a more public life in photography and related fields. For those who have seen Brecht's *Threepenny Opera* (Domino Players at the end of February) and/or Fritz Lang's incredible film, *M* (free screening on Tuesday, March 3), this lecture will be especially appropriate. The lecture is free and open to the public.

## 15. Library & Educational Technology Update

- The Library was busy this fall working with students and faculty. As compared to the Fall 2007 statistics:
  - reference transactions during the semester were up 26.6%

- both the number of students attending and the number of library instructional sessions provided doubled
- general library attendance was up 35%, and
- despite Google, general book circulation and reserve usage stayed even (drop of .8%).
- The library is looking for faculty with expertise in Office 2003 and 2007 to assist in workshops for faculty, staff and students. Contact Rob LeBlanc ([rleblanc@alb.edu](mailto:rleblanc@alb.edu) or x7210) to help out the Albright community.
- **March 16** is the date for the next **Educational Technology Workshop**. This workshop will discuss how better to use the technology we already have available as well as how some of the newer technology (called web 2.0) and open source software may help you teach, research and communicate more productively. *This workshop is open to all full and part time faculty members.*

**16. Writing Center Update:** The writing center closed for break after a successful fall semester. During fall of 2008, the writing center provided over 250 hours of tutoring, conducting over 490 one-on-one tutoring sessions. These numbers represent a 69% increase in tutoring hours and a 37% increase in actual sessions from fall 2007. During interim, seven students took *English 383 Writing and Learning* where they were introduced to writing center theory and practice. In addition to class time, English 383 students tutored in the writing center and conducted two group tutoring sessions in Dr. Liz Freund's *Politics and Film* class. All students from English 383 have been invited to join the writing center staff in the spring semester. On Monday, February 23, 2009, Melissa Nicolas will be conducting a Dean's Seminar entitled, "What the Heck Do They Do Over There?! A Conversation about Albright's Writing Center." The purpose of this seminar is to provide faculty with information about the writing center's purpose and mission as well as to dispel some common myths about the center. The writing center will open for the spring semester on Sunday, February 1<sup>st</sup>. Writing center hours will be Sunday-Thursday from 3:00-9:00 and appointments will be available with our ESL specialist (days and times TBA).

**17. Enrollment Management:**

**Fall Applications** – Over 5000 students have applied to Albright's fall class. We are presently running up about 33% in applications and 23% in acceptances. While this is reason for optimism, we must remember how dependant our families are on financial aid when making their decisions. Financial aid awards will begin to go out this month. It is wonderful that we have such a large pool of students interested in Albright; however, we do expect our yield to decrease because of financial hardships that many of these students have or may endure.

**Shirk Scholarship** – We received 108 Shirk Scholarship applications, a 7% increase from last year. Scholarship decisions will be completed prior to the cabinet meeting. We interviewed a record number of students through the scholarship process this year. *Thank you to everyone who assisted with interviews and the interview days.*

**Yield Events** – The admission office with the assistance of the advancement office are coordinating four alumni admitted student receptions. We expect to host three receptions for accepted students. Dates and locations are TBA.
